MOTIVATIONS FOR VOLUNTEERISM AMONG FILIPINO ...

Snyder's functional approach theory suggests that human behavior is motivated by specific 'selfish' goal or needs (Clary & Snyder, 1991) In this case, people volunteer because it may serve one or more goal needs Indeed, motivation is the cause of underlying behavior that is characterized by willingness and volition (Guay et al, 2010)

In addition, most studies on adolescent volunteerism are focused solely on volunteering behavior[19,20] Cognitive-motivational perspective suggests that one's behavior is influenced both by beliefs and intention[21] Given that volunteerism is also a type of planned behavior, the roles of beliefs and intention are more prominent
